

First Student Art Exhibit Shown

The work on display in the gallery presents a cross-section of current work selected from the art classes. Several contributions are from the pre-requisite course, Art I, composed, in the main, of freshmen. In this group, the media were dictated by the problem. One such problem, dealing with color, finds an interesting solution in warmly-hued bits of paper, entitled "Fall."

Quite different from the other works are the two selections from the art education classes. The brightly colored paintings were done by those interested in teaching in the early grades, and one was painted from a child's view, his understanding and enjoyment in mind.

The casein paintings by advanced students present quite a contrast to the work of the art education classes in both medium and technique, offering a study in depth and sophisticated coloring.

The works in the student exhibit were selected under the direction of Mrs. Ruth Clarke, head of the art department.

The delegates also will be guests of the Orchestral Association of Chicago, at a concert given by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, directed by Fritz Reiner.
